



# Tried and True Events

## **Boston**

Here are four tried and true events for Boston's ACE Advocates region.

1) **Essay Review Night at Trinity Catholic High School:** Volunteers work one on one with a Trinity senior who has come to the event with an essay prepared. The volunteer works with the student on his or her essay and talks to the student about the college process. He or she may even conduct a "mock interview" with each student as a way to prepare for college interviews.

2) **FASFA Night at Trinity Catholic High School:** This is probably the most tried and true event of BACE. All seniors and/or parents are invited to Trinity one night in January where they receive a computer and are walked through the online FASFA. An admissions counselor at Brown is the MVP of the night; she leads the students/parents through any questions they may have. The other volunteers will stand in the gap as needed, from helping parents learn how to use the computer to supplying snacks, to answering questions.

3) **Spring Clean Up at St. Patricks School:** The event has taken place in the second weekend of May. Beforehand, the school alerts the Boston region about their needs (e.g., painting gym walls, cleaning windows, mowing the lawn). Then Advocates spend the day trying to complete all the projects (while also having a great time with each other!). BACE purchases all materials and leaves anything left with the school. The day ends with Mass at the school.

4) **Advent Day (Afternoon) of Reflection:** One Saturday in December, BACE has an afternoon of reflection followed by Mass and dinner. The reflection usually starts in the late afternoon and lasts about 3 hours—just enough to get some distance from the busyness of the season. Sometimes the group ends the evening with a Christmas caroling trip to a local retirement community.

## **Columbus**

In terms of strategy, our advocates in Columbus have tried to take advantage of existing connections with the Notre Dame Club of Columbus, and specifically, the Young Alumni group. The Young Alumni have been especially receptive because they already have background knowledge of ACE, whereas the older alums and board members don't. Regional chair Jess Fries-Gaither advises, "So...reach out to the YA groups to plan joint events, recruit new members, raise awareness, etc."

The Columbus team has also focused on new ACE grads returning to the area, including those who have done ALP. In a similar vein, they've reached out to other individuals who have similar mindsets regarding Catholic education. The region is new, but they believe this will prove to be a good strategy in the future.

Fries-Gaither concludes, "I think we're learning the virtue of persistence and continued invitations to events. Sometimes, people need to get settled or deal with personal situations before they can become involved

with the group. I think we're seeing that this year, as we have an individual in particular who didn't want to really get involved last year but has agreed to serve on the RLT this year."

## **Denver**

### **Beanbags for Books Cornhole Tournament**

The Denver Advocates hosted a "Beanbags for Books" Cornhole Tournament at a local park in Denver. Teams of 2 paid a \$30.00 entrance fee to play, and roughly 22 teams spent an afternoon outdoors, having fun and raising money for Catholic Schools. The Denver Advocates provided food, drinks and prizes for the top three teams. (All the prizes were donated by a local bar.) The event raised over \$700 for the sponsored school and gathered 3 boxes of books for the school. A flyer announcing this fundraiser is attached.

### **Happy Hour Fundraiser**

For the past two years Denver Advocates have hosted this very successful fundraising event in conjunction with a local watering hole in the city to raise money for a local low-income Catholic School.

The event typically offers 5-7 silent auction items for patrons to bid on, free food, happy hour drink prices, and a "giving tree" complete with items requested by teachers at the school. (These items are smaller in value, ranging from \$5.00-\$50.00, prices that better cater to our audience for the event.)

Denver Advocates chair Sarah Grey reports, "This is a very easy event to host because it requires minimal work for the Advocates, it's really fun and a great chance for the staff of the school to mingle with younger local Catholic School supporters. Each time we have hosted this event, we have raised over \$1000 for the school and also dropped off bags full of items purchased from the giving tree. One of the reasons this event is so successful is because it provides the chance for young adults in the area to help support schools, people who may not be able to attend the other "big ticket" fundraisers the schools have."

## **Indy**

The Indy Advocates have for the past 3 years planned 4 Mass/Fellowship/Service days per year to reach and connect with a growing network of Catholic school supporters in the Indianapolis region. See the flyer attached.

## **Los Angeles**

### **Professional Groups**

The LA Advocates region is going to try to have 3 groups based on John's pilot model for next year, believing there is great potential for this model to transform education by utilizing the gifts of educators across all ages, educational backgrounds, and experiences. It's a win-win-win for *teachers* because of the intentional planning and challenging professional development, for *students* because of the increase in

rigor and thoroughness of units, and for *schools* because teachers realize the effectiveness of the collaborative work and share it with colleagues.

### ***New Jersey***

#### **Saturday Fun**

The NJ region holds a two-hour Saturday Fun event once a month at their partner school, Sacred Heart, an inner-city Catholic School in Jersey City, NJ. This program provides an opportunity for students in grades 3-6 to play safely, use their gym, have an art/craft class, and to be exposed to activities and experiences that are not part of their regular school day and would not otherwise be available to them. The program has included everything from inviting local artists to lead art workshops to hosting a field day to painting pumpkins to putting on a small play. The program has also evolved into a service opportunity for the high school students, as they come volunteer their time each month, creating a particularly memorable experience for all parties.

#### **Christmas Card Fundraiser**

The NJ region sponsors a Christmas card fundraiser at their partner school, Sacred Heart. During the October Saturday Fun event, students create and submit Christmas card designs. The Advocates choose a few designs and create order forms asking people to order cards by mid-November for \$1 each. An order is placed with Vistaprint and cards arrive in early December for distribution to those who purchased them.

### ***Philly***

**The Philly region is trying to raise more awareness about PHACE - Philadelphia Advocates for Catholic Education.** They write, "We want to increase the amount of advocates and also spread the knowledge of PHACE around Philly. This year we are focusing on mass/meal fellowship events for new Catholic school teachers in Philly. We are planning on doing 2 days of Service for DePaul Catholic school - one being onsite, and one being a book drive/pancake breakfast. We also hope to hold a larger fundraiser event in the Spring to benefit to the DePaul Catholic scholarship fund. "We are looking to see what other schools needs are and perhaps organize a professional development day for the teachers. These are all things we hope to accomplish."

### ***South Bend***

The South Bend ACE Advocates has two prayer/Bible study groups. One group gathers twice monthly for food, fellowship, and prayer. Each evening begins with Mass and dinner; after dinner, the group reads aloud and discusses a passage from Scripture. For the past three years, the group has collectively chosen a book of the Bible to read all year; this year, they are progressing through Genesis chapter by chapter. Local ACE Advocates take turns hosting these friendly, spiritually enriching community gatherings.

The second prayer/Bible study group is composed of young families who strive to meet every other month and on special liturgical events to pray together, enjoy a meal together, and share in play together. One

family prepares the prayer, often in the form of a topic of discussion, as well as hosting a meal at the home. The primary focus is to recognize that parents are the first, best educators of their children in the model of Mary and Joseph, something woven into the philosophical fabric of Catholic education and

Catholic schools. According to Advocate Chad Barwick, “We hope that these fellowship-building events plant seeds of prayerful contemplation about the vocation of marriage and of the miracle of children, as well as creating a community of faith among like-minded families.”

South Bend’s “tried and true” event is its annual fundraiser. Information about that is in the following section, including an invitation, letters to vendors and donors, volunteer sign-ups, and more.

### ***Washington, DC***

The DC “signature event” is Trivia Night. Attached is the invitation email they used last fall through MailChimp. About that, they say, “While it looks nice, we found that personal emails to friends and acquaintances proved a much better recruitment tool.” Also attached are a summary of the event from 2008 and the documents used to create the trivia questions and clues (which can often be the most difficult part!).
