ACE in Chile (ChACE) offers an 18-month post-graduate teaching experience in Santiago, Chile, for graduates of ACE and other University Consortium for Catholic Education (UCCE) programs. "ChACErs" spend one academic year teaching 1st-12th grade English at Saint George's College while enhancing their teaching, leadership, and Spanish language skills.
